Steve Forsythe – "Everybody is different

Steve Forsythe is a 64 yearold published writer, radio personality, comedian, motivational speaker and friend to many. Steve also has cerebral palsy, but he's not defined by his disability. This man is defined by his love of life!

In 2005, Steve wrote and self-published his story in a

book titled All Sides of Me. Although the book is no longer available, he shared some of his best advice from it during our phone interview; "Everyone should set reasonable goals and work toward meeting those goals. A person can't ever quit!"

Steve lives by his own advice and four years ago he began a weekly radio show on 88.1 KZGM-FM called the Forsythe Forum. When asked how he came to do a radio show, he replied, "I grew up with a microphone in my hand!"

Seriously, about 5 years ago, he met KY3 Sports Director Ned Reynolds (now retired). Ned's advice when Steve mentioned his idea of having a radio show, "... go for it!" Steve did just that and now broadcasts every Thursday morning from 9 to 9:30. The two men remain friends and talk every few months.

Steve also has a comedy routine which he's performed in many Missouri locations including Springfield, Joplin and Neosho. He likes to begin his shows with, "Hello ladies and gentlemen. I'm Steve Forsythe from Cabool, Missouri. Sometimes I do standup comedy, sometimes I do sit down comedy and sometimes I do fall down comedy!"

Steve is passionate about helping disabled people. He



thoroughly enjoys doing motivational speaking to encourage everyone to live life to the fullest regardless if one has a disability or not. He is happy to speak to any school, church or civic organization and can be contacted at (417) 962-3855 or P.O. Box 57, Cabool, MO 65689.

Did I mention that Steve has cerebral palsy and a speech impairment? Does he let this stop him from helping others and being a contributing citizen in his community? NO! As evidenced in the proceeding paragraphs, Steve is certainly active in his community and state. He was actually the very first consumer of Ozark Independent Living (OIL) services when the office opened twenty years ago. He benefits from two of the three OIL services; the Independent Living Services (ILS) and Consumer Directed Services (CDS). ILS provides items such as durable medical equipment and wheelchair ramps for individuals who meet all criteria. CDS offers qualifying individuals the opportunity to hire attendant(s) of their own choosing. Steve employs three attendants and he directs when they work and what they do for him. His attendants do things by his schedule and he says, "They make a person feel more independent."

Steve also wanted to share how the Independent Living (IL) movement got started, and some of the information gleaned from http://www.nilp.org/about-us/history/ is printed here.

The Independent Living (IL) movement started in the early 70's when the Berkeley Center for Independent Living in California was founded by Ed Roberts and others with disabilities who

were attending the University of California at Berkeley. Ed, who was a post polio quad, was living in a hospital and was required to be back in his room by 10 PM. He was denied the right to make many of the basic decisions college students took for granted. So Ed, with the help of some federal funding, started the first Center for Independent Living (CIL). The Center focused on assisting people with disabilities to live in the community with whatever supports they needed.

Today there are over 600 Independent Living (IL) Centers throughout the US that practice the cross disability philosophy: the belief that all people with disabilities share a common thread that brings them together.

When asked if he had any final words or advice, he answered, "Everybody is different. People want to baby disabled people. Don't do that! Find work for disabled people – make them feel valued."

Steve's motto: "Put a little humor into your life every day; it may bring a smile to your heart."




