Travis Coatney and Hope Outdoors Consumer Directed Services Spotlight



Local hunter Travis Coatney recently appeared on the Outdoor Channel.

It featured local resident Travis Coatney of Norwood in a hunt put together by Hope Outdoors for hunters with disabilities. Hope Outdoors is a non-denominational, Christian ministry which is based in Alabama but which helps people from all around the country with disabilities (or who have experienced other life-altering events) to be able to hunt and fish. According to their website, "Hope Outdoors stops at nothing to restore a sense of hope in children and adults living with special needs. When the world says 'No,' we say 'Yes!' When the world says, 'can't' we find a way."

Not only did Travis participate in the televised hunt, but he recognized the importance and value of what Hope Outdoors does, and he wanted to be involved on the organizing side, helping others. So Travis and two of his friends, Chris Forrester and Chad Sullivan, have formed the Tri-county Chapter of Hope Outdoors. They are focused on Douglas, Texas and Wright as their base for finding private land owners who will let hunts be conducted on their property, but participants can be from anywhere in the country.

Their first event will be a Youth Turkey Hunt for hunters with disabilities ages 6-15, to be held April 6-8 in Norwood. They are finding corporate and local sponsors, along with hosting fund-raising events and seeking contributions to help make sure the hunters, who participate free of charge, are outfitted with everything they need, including adaptive firearms to use during the hunt. Travis hopes the page will get shared far and wide to get the word out about the event and about Hope Outdoors.

The base for the Youth Turkey Hunt will be the Union Grove "Caudle" FVVB Church, 2550 Thomas RD, Norwood. Some parts of the event are open to the public, including meals at 6 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, April 6 and 7. Sunday morning church service on April 8 begins at 11 a.m. with a meal to follow. The group plans fishing trips, too, and their goal is to schedule special hunts during all hunting seasons. Travis said getting to make new friends and build relationships is the best part for him. "It's a ministry. We want to give someone hope who might not have a whole lot. The hunting is just a bonus."

Travis is an OIL CDS consumer who is a quadriplegic with very limited mobility of his arms and hands. He has been full-time in a wheelchair since 2010 following a vehicle accident. His full story was featured in the July-August 2014 Pipeline (formerly the Gusher). Travis has always been an athlete, and after the accident he took up fishing and hunting to continue to be as active as possible outdoors.

For a glimpse into Travis's attitude about life and his desire to help others, here's a quote from him, "Life's too short to sit around and be miserable. I look around and have so much to be thankful for."

Houston Project Provides Accessibility: Melba Performing Arts Center



About seventy-five years after the curtain went up for the first time at the Melba Theatre in downtown Houston, several organizations worked to renovate the historic building.

The theatre had been closed since the early 1980s, and special consideration was given to accommodate those with disabilities.

The project, which created the Melba Performing Arts Center, includes the original Melba building and commercial structures on each side of it. Downtown Houston Inc. led the effort. Formed in 1999, the group has led several successful projects, including the development of the Lone Star Plaza after a devastating fire and a major renovation of the former Haney Market, which is now the Houston Visitors Center and home to the Houston Area Chamber of Commerce. Most recently it turned three empty downtown storefronts into the Lone Star Annex, which includes offices for University Extension, a community room and a commercial kitchen with walkin cooler.

The Melba project captured the imagination of Houston residents because of the happy memories associated with the town's original movie house.

The Irwin Seat Company in Michigan designed the seating for the theatre and it has handicapped accessibility (ADA compliant) and space at the rear of the seating area for wheelchairs. Designated seating is also marked. All the openings into various rooms including the concession stand — are extra wide.

Resources

Be My Eyes - an app that lets you "lend your eyes to the blind"

Be My Eyes is an app that connects blind and visually impaired individuals with sighted volunteers from around the world via live video call.

How It Works

A blind person requests assistance in the Be My Eyes app. The challenge that he/she needs help with can be anything from knowing the expiration date on milk to finding lost items to navigating new surroundings, with certain activities prohibited.

A volunteer helper who speaks the same language receives a notification for help and a live video connection is established. (Time zones are taken into account so no one is disturbed at odd hours, and if one volunteer is busy, the call goes on to the next person on the list.) From the live video the volunteer can help the blind person by answering the question they need answered.

Currently there are 46,000 individuals who are blind and 603,000 volunteers in the network. Organizers invite more people to sign up and ask everyone to help spread the word.

For Students with Disabilities A SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY

The Gary Moll Memorial Scholarship is for Missouri students with disabilities who are attending or will be enrolling in a **junior college, college, university or accredited vocational school** in the state of Missouri.

Students applying for the scholarship must be sponsored by a Missouri Center for Independent Living. Ozark Independent Living is the sponsoring center for the seven-county region of Douglas, Howell, Oregon, Ozark, Shannon, Texas and Wright. Proof of enrollment is a requirement and students will be strongly encouraged to submit one or two letters of recommendation. After students submit the required information, OIL will complete the application and submit to the Missouri Statewide Independent Living Council (MOSILC).

Applications should be in the hands of OIL no later than April 23, 2018, and we will then forward them to MOSILC's Youth Transition Committee. They will review all applications and schedule interviews by phone or other means of communication, with up to five finalists chosen. Winners will be announced in May. There is no dollar amount given in the guidelines, but two scholarships are available and typically they are in the approximate amount of \$1,000 each.

DID YOU KNOW the Mo. Dept. of Conservation has a rod-and-reel loan program? Check with the Mo. Dept. of Conservation for locations (call the regional office, 417-256-7161) but in our seven-county area, many public libraries are participating. Ozark and Wright Counties do not have locations listed on the MDC website, huntfish.mdc.mo.gov/fishing/get-started-

fishing/rod-and-reel-loaner-locations, but there are multiple locations in other counties.

Other State Resources

One excellent source of information for assistive technology, including possible funding sources and equipment lending programs, is on the State of Missouri's website.

Included is information about "Show Me Loans," Missouri's low-interest loan program is for assistive technology devices, hearing aids, home access modifications and vehicle access.
