In the Senior Division, age 65 and over, first place was awarded to Janice Daniels, Raymondville, for her painting of a bridge; second place was won by Jean Nielson, West Plains, for a still life painting; and third place went to Mtn. Grove resident Jeanette Dalton for her painting of a sailboat.

In the Adult Division, age 18 and over, first place was awarded to Mtn. View

resident Nicole Feller for her painting of clouds. Second place was also won by Feller in the photography division. Third place went to Rachel Frederickson, Cabool, for a small painting of trees and birds.

In the 17-and-under division, first place winner is Colton Anderson, Gainesville, for his painting of a wood duck. Anderson also won third place in his division with a pencil drawing of a bird. Second place is a painting of a lion by Isabella Farrar, West Plains.

May was designated as Older Americans Month by the Administration for Community Living (ACL) which is part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. It's a department that many have likely never heard of, but it offers resources and advocacy yearround.

The mission of ACL is: **Advancing independence**, integration, and inclusion throughout life.

ACL.gov says, "The Administration for Community Living was created around the fundamental principle that older adults and people of all ages with disabilities should be able to live where they choose, with the people they choose, and with the ability to participate fully in their communities. By funding services and supports provided by networks of community-based organizations, and with investments in research, education, and innovation, ACL helps make this principle a reality for millions of Americans."

Staffer Spotlight

TERRY HAMPTON Marketing/Independent Living Specialist

Terry has been at OIL since September 2015. She says, "I came to work for Ozark Independent Living from the West Plains Daily Quill where I had been a reporter, photographer and columnist. My main duties to start with at OIL were marketing and promotion. I arrived just as we were getting ready to celebrate our 20th anniversary in 2016."

Most of that first year was devoted to organizing and publicizing the events to mark that milestone year, but since then Terry has been devoting more and more time to the Independent Living portion of her job, although she says there is overlap in working in two departments.

"One thing I focus on is TAP (Telecommunication Access Program) for Telephone. This is a program offered by Missouri Assistive Technology which enables us to get adaptive phone equipment for individuals who have difficulty communicating on standard phones," Terry said. Qualified individuals can obtain free devices. "I love this service we offer. Those who especially benefit from TAP are older folks who have trouble hearing on the phone. Being able to get a phone with adjustable volume can make a really big difference in helping individuals stay independent."

Appointments can be made to stop by the office for a phone demonstration, but Terry also travels throughout OIL's seven counties demonstrating the equipment and signing people up for the phones. "When I go out to talk about TAP, I also discuss OIL's other services, so it presents a good marketing opportunity," she said.

She is also responsible for The Pipeline quarterly

newsletter – the writing, photography, interviews, layout, etc. – and for a monthly email version of the newsletter. She writes press releases and otherwise publicizes activities and maintains OIL's Facebook page and website. She helps identify potential disability resources and distributes the information to OIL staff and to the community.

A native and life-long resident of rural West Plains, she graduated with the West Plains High School Class of 1979 and also attended Southwest Mo. State University-West Plains (now MSU-WP).

Terry has served on various boards and done volunteer work in the community through the years. She currently represents OIL on several organizations/committees, including Interagency Councils throughout OIL's seven-county service area, the Howell County Long-Term Recovery Committee, West Plains and Mtn. View Chambers of Commerce, Region 8 Project Homeless Connect, Ozark Action partnerships, and the Focus on Babies Diaper Resource Center.

Terry previously worked in the Development Office at MSU-WP and for many years was active in community theater. She and her husband, Allen, have owned several businesses in West Plains.

"Allen and I enjoy the outdoors and spend a lot of our time working on our property, which is an ongoing, labor-intensive project! I like to garden, and after completing Master Gardeners training two years ago, I've been working more on landscaping and flower gardening which is one way I relax. We like to travel and see different parts of the country. We also love to spend time with our daughter, her husband and our two grandsons," she says. "We always have a good time when we're together whether it's playing board games, taking road trips or sometimes just laughing at ourselves."

Terry is a published author and says she likes to "write, read and learn new things every day."

MOSILC Executive Director visits Ozark Independent Living

Missouri Statewide Independent Living Council (MOSILC) Executive Director Adonis Brown, at left above, and his wife, Clementine, who are based in Jefferson City, stopped by OIL recently on their swing through the southern part of the state, visiting Centers for Independent Living (CILs). At right in the photo is OIL Independent Living Services Manager Kathy Bauer.

By federal law (The Rehabilitation Act of 1973), each state is required to maintain a statewide independent living council (SILC). The Council and CILs within the state develop a State Plan for Independent Living (SPIL). The SPIL is a document required by law that indicates how the IL Network is going to improve independent living services for individuals with disabilities. It identifies the needs and priorities of consumers, providers, and other stakeholders and sets forth goals and objectives to respond to them.

Adonis has been Executive Director for the past year and half, moving to Missouri from North Carolina. He says he wants to "Make the SILC known as a leading voice in the Disability Community." His further goal is to unify all 22 centers for independent living in the state. "All have specialties, and I want them to be communicating, all on the same page and involved in the SILC."

It was a pleasure meeting Adonis and Clementine. Thanks for all you do! **Vision**: MOSILC envisions a Missouri in which people with disabilities live safely in the environment of their choice, are valued equally, and participate fully.

MOSILC COUNCIL MEMBERS SOUGHT

MOSILC Executive Director Adonis Brown says members are needed to serve on the statewide council. **"Someone who is a strong advocate and open-minded to all disabilities,"** he said.

From the mosilc.org website, here is additional information about serving on the council:

Membership – The council consists of a minimum of nine members and a maximum of 17 members. A minimum of 51 percent of the members must have significant disabilities. Members represent a range of geographical areas and disabilities. The governor of Missouri appoints the membership.

Meetings – The Statewide Independent Living Council meets quarterly (in February, May, August, and November) in Jefferson City and other locations around the state. Information on meetings, minutes, the SPIL, membership, etc., can be accessed on the SILC website or by calling the SILC. Meetings are open to the public and accommodations must be requested at least three days before a meeting.

Serving on the council is a volunteer position, but Adonis said that there is funding available to help council members with expenses associated with attending the meetings.

What to do about possible identity theft when a loved one passes away

A study by risk-management firm ID Analytics found that nearly 800,000 deceased Americans' identities are used by fraudsters each year. This kind of ID theft has little financial consequence, says Eva Velasquez, head of the Identity Theft Resource Center, but contesting it can be time-consuming and emotionally draining.

When a family member dies, make sure their credit file is closed and cannot be misused. First, pull credit

reports to see what accounts are open. A social security number and other personal information will be required.

A copy of the death certificate will need to be sent to Experian, Equifax, and TransUnion. Contact them to find out acceptable format of the certificate, and ask them to amend their files so new credit can't be granted in the deceased person's name. Then contact each creditor cited on the reports to tell them that your loved one's account needs to be closed. *Source: Money.com*

In celebration of National Disability Employment Awareness Month in October

...the Governor's Council on Disability is sponsoring a poster contest to raise awareness about the importance of including individuals with disabilities in the workforce.
