## **Be Aware of Scams**

We've all heard it, but it bears repeating that scammers are increasingly **using phone calls**, **emails** and even **texts** to impersonate government officials in an attempt to steal money and personal information by claiming to represent a government agency such as Social Security, the IRS or the Dept. of Health and Human Services.

Some even "spoof" their phone number or email address to look like the call or email is coming from a legitimate government source. They tell people they've "won the lottery" sponsored by the federal government, for example, or "owe a debt" to the IRS that must be paid back immediately. They may even claim that a person's social security number has been linked to criminal activities and suspended, and all they have to do to reactivate it is to confirm the social security number. They will often use threats of arrest or harsh legal action to create a sense of panic, and demand payment via wire transfer or gift card. With tax season and the census, scam attempts will likely increase.

#### Here is what we all need to remember:

1. The government will NEVER call out of the blue and ask for a social security number.

2. The government <u>will NEVER ask for payment by gift</u> card or wire transfer.

3. Social security numbers cannot be suspended.

- If you are ever suspicious about a call, hang up.
- Never click on an e-mail link or attachment unless you fully trust the sender.
- Never pay someone you do not know via gift card or wire transfer.

• Always be cautious about giving out your personal or financial information, including your Medicare or Social Security numbers, or any banking information.

Be AWARE. Be CAREFUL. Don't be taken advantage of!

# **Staffer Spotlight**

## GLENN CARGILE CDS Manager

Consumer Directed Services Manager Glenn Cargile is in the Staffer Spotlight in this issue of The Pipeline. Following is Glenn's bio.

Glenn grew up in Eagle Rock, Missouri, which is in the Cassville area where he graduated high school. After high school he attended College of the Ozarks where he received bachelor's degrees in Psychology and Sociology. While in college he worked for his grandparents in their liquidation business and retail shops in Branson and Eureka Springs. He also had joined the US Army Reserves after high school and served while in college.

Glenn says, "My first job in the public sector was with Burrell Behavioral Heath where I worked in

the adolescent group home. I worked for Burrell/Cox Hospital for 15 years in various capacities in residential treatment. I ended my tenure as the Administrative Coordinator for their children, adolescent, young adult, and C-star programs. Thinking that I was going to do therapy, I got a Masters in Social Work at SMSU but ended up spending most of my career doing administrative and customer service."

Entrepreneurship was the next phase of his life, which began when he took over some rental property and a landscaping company. "Over the next 10 years I would develop Gold Medal Properties LLC into a holding company for which I managed my residential and commercial properties and did management for other landlords who lived out of state. Under this umbrella I owned and operated several businesses over the years to include landscaping, general contractor, remodeling, gymnastics and a spa. To help maneuver the many obstacles of being a small business owner, I went back and got a Master's in Business Administration with Webster University."

While he worked in the private sector he stayed connected with his roots in the public sector by serving on several boards and in other volunteer positions including the Workforce Investment Board (WIB), chaired Youth Council for WIB, served as a Surrogate Parent for D.E.A.S.E., as a Big Brother volunteer and CASA advocate.

Glenn said, "Several years ago I had an opportunity to sell a huge portion of my business, which I did and went on to sell the rest of my commercial and residential properties. I listed my house for sale, and it sold in two days. In 30 days I found myself without a place to live or a job so went to Pasadena California for a few months but ended up coming back to Missouri. I stayed at our cabin out CC Highway near Hammonds Mill, but since the cabin is primitive and winter would be coming, I found a house in West Plains and begin a nine-month remodel project."

After a year of semi-retirement Glenn went to work for SeniorAge as the Administrator for the Willow Springs Senior Center. "I worked there for six months before – and I quote 'was stolen away' by OIL."

Glenn's hobbies are traveling, working in his yard and taking day trips to hike nature trails. He says his 'bucket list' would be to travel from coast to coast in an RV, stopping at every national and state park along the way.

"I have been the CDS Manager for three years and every day is a new adventure. What I like most about my job is assisting others in navigating the system to get the help they need. I am an advocate for those who have limitation but still want to be able to live independently," Glenn said.

# **Agency and Community Partnerships**

The fifth annual Project Homeless Connect (PHC) was recently held at Ozark Action in West Plains.



Two dozen area agencies took part in the event, including representatives of Ozark Independent Living. According to Ozark Action, organizer of the event, PHC is a national best-practice model to serve people who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

Approximately 50 individuals attended the 'one-stop shop' of health and human services, which has as its overall goal to reduce barriers by improving access to services and housing.

Attendees identified as vulnerable were able to access a variety of services and find out about what else might be available to them. This included: medical and mental health care; assistance in dealing with substance abuse; help with housing, other benefits and legal issues; dental and vision care; help with getting birth certificates and photo identification; and food, clothing and haircuts.

## Here are steps being taken at OIL to help keep from catching/spreading illnesses:


- We will be asking our consumers if they are feeling well BEFORE going to see them.
- We will also be asking about others living in the home. If someone is ill, we will
- postpone the visit. If staffers arrive at a home and someone is ill, they will not stay.

• If staffers are ill, they DO NOT COME TO WORK, especially if they have a fever. ANYONE who is feeling ill should avoid going out into the community and exposing others.

There's no need to panic, but we've all heard the old saying attributed to Ben Franklin, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." That seems like good advice!
